Mr. Key, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

THE committee on the expiring laws of this state, report, that the following laws expire this session, and submit the propriety of continuing them respectively until the 30th day of January, 1798. Your committee, in the course of investigating this subject, have found that a great number of the laws of this state expire at various periods between this session and the year eighteen hundred and three; and very confiderable difficulties occur, which must annually increase, from the legislature limitting no definite period at which all temporary laws should expire. With a view to make the annual duty of the committee of expiring laws more simple and less laborious, and to introduce uniformity in the duration of temporary laws, this committee are induced to lay before the house, not only the laws expiring with this fession, but those that expire at and before the end of this century, and they trust to the indulgence of the house in case any omissions have happened, which, from the intricacy of the subject, and their attendance to their duty in the house, might have escaped the most diligent investigation.
