GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE,

THIS house is now ready to close the session, and propose adjourning to the first Monday of October next.

The bill in favour of the president and directors of the Patowmack Company, and the commissioners of the federal buildings, was read the second time, and passed. Sent to the senate by the clerk.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore pay unto Allen B. Duckett the sum of twenty-two pounds ten shillings current money, for his attention and services at the table during this session as assistant clerk. Sent to the senate by the clerk.

BY THE SENATE, DECEMBER 25, 1794.

GENTLEMEN,

WE have rejected the resolution in favour of Henry Carbury, because doubts may arise whether the treasurer would think himself authorized to pay the salary, which seems intended for the person who may hold the office of adjutant-general, to any other person who might be appointed in the place of Henry Carbury upon his death or resignation. We should have no objection to pass a resolution, authorizing and directing the treasurer of the western shore to pay to the adjutant-general for the time being two hundred pounds current money, in quarterly payments, provided he shall reside or keep an office at the seat of government.
