On motion, the question was put, That the house concur with that part of the report that respects Thomas O'Bryon? Resolved in the affirmative.

Leave given to bring in a bill. ORDERED, That Mr. Hollingsworth, Mr. M'Comas and Mr.

Montgomery, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

A memorial from the creditors of Thomas Hare, counter to his petition for an act of infolvency, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee on the petitions of infolvent debtors to confider and report thereon.

A petition from Edward Johnson, executor of William M'Laughlin, late of Baltimore county, deceased, stating, that he stands charged on the treasury books with a considerable sum of money for arrearages of taxes and public dues, and praying the executive may be authorifed to fettle and

adjust the accounts of his testator with the state, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Winchester, Mr. Ridgely, of William, and Mr. Mackall, to consider and report thereon.
