THE committee to whom was referred the petition of Emory Sudler, junior, and wife, of Queen-Anne's county, executors of William Wright, who was collector of the tax of faid county in the years seventeen hundred and eighty-one and two, report, that they have taken the same into confideration, and believe the facts therein stated to be true, and that in transacting his said office of collector he paid to the state one hundred and twenty-eight bushels and one half bushel of wheat more than he received from the receiver appointed by the commissioners of the tax for the district of Church-hill. Your committee are of opinion, that at the time the loss of the wheat happened, the intrinsic value was only five shillings, although by the act of seventeen hundred and eighty-one it was to be received for taxes at the rate of one dollar per buffiel; they are therefore of opinion, that the faid Emory Sudler, and wife, as executors of the faid William Wright, has a just elaim against the state-of thirty-two pounds two shillings and fix-pence, with interest from the first day of January, feventees hundred and eighty-two, in lieu of and in fatisfaction for the one hundred and twentyeight and an half bushels of wheat advanced to the state by the faid William Wright, as collector of the tax as aforefaid, and submit the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Emory Sudler, junior, and wife, executors of William Wright, the sum of thirty-two pounds two shillings and six-pence, with interest from the first day of January, seventeen hundred and eighty-two, in satisfaction for one hundred and twenty-eight bushels and one half bushel of wheat, which the faid William Wright, as collector of the tax for Queen-Anne's county in the years seventeen hundred and eighty-one and seventeen hundred and eighty-two, accounted for with the state more than he received, by means of the ravages of the fly while the wheat remained in the public granaries appointed by law, and before the

commissary ordered the same to be taken away.

Whereas John Lethrbury and John Wilkins, securities for John Denwood, late sheriff and collector of Somerset county, became liable to pay to the state a considerable sum of money, and as fifteen per cent. has been incurred on the faid judgment, RESOLVED, That the faid John Lethrbury and John Wilkins be and they are hereby released from the payment of the said fifteen per cent. on

the payment of the interest of fix per cent. on the principal sum.

. Which was read the first and second time, and the resolution therein contained affented to. Mr. Ridout, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred the memorial of the vifitors and governors of St. John's college, report, hat they have taken the same under consideration, and find that from the tenth day of November, Teventeen hundred and ninety-four, to the tenth day of November, seventeen hundred and ninety-five, the following payments have been made for the use of the college, viz. By the state of Maryland the annual donation, £. 1750, by several subscribers £. 713 17 6, and by the students for tuition, fire-wood, pens and ink, £. 570 13 4, amounting in the whole to £. 3034 15 10.

The committee also find, that from the tenth day of November, seventeen hundred and ninety-

four, to the tenth day of November, seventeen hundred and ninety-five, the said visitors and governors have paid away the sum of f. 1058 12 in salaries to the several professors and masters of said college, and the sum of f. 187 10 to the guardians of the poor boys on the soundation of said col-

lege, which faid payments amount in the whole to f. 2146 2.

The committee further find, that during the last year some money has been expended in repairing and completing the buildings, and improving the grounds of the college, under the direction and management of some of the board of visitors and governors, who have, for that purpose, a power of drawing on their treasurer for a sum not exceeding f. 1250, but a particular account of the expenditures of this money has not been laid before the committee, nor has any account come to their hands of the sums expended in the purchase of necessary articles for the use of the seminary, or of the commissions paid to their treasurer and collector.
