

strong liquors, and running of horse races, near the yearly meetings of the people called Quakers, and to prevent the tumultuous concourse of negroes and other slaves during the said meetings, passed June session, one thousand seven hundred and fifty-two; another act, entitled, An additional supplementary act to the act, entitled, An act relating to servants and slaves, passed May session, one thousand seven hundred and forty-eight; another act, entitled, An act to prevent the exportation of flour, staves and shingles, not merchantable, from the town of Baltimore, in Baltimore county, and to regulate the weight of hay, and measure of grain, salt, flax-seed and fire-wood, within the said town, and to prevent the exportation of flour not merchantable from Fell's-Point, in the said county, passed October session, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-one; another act, entitled, An act for the better regulating attachments, passed June session, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-three; another act, entitled, An act to ascertain officers fees in special courts, passed May session, one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one.

The resolution in favour of John Lethbury and John Wilkins, the bill to appoint an agent for the year seventeen hundred and ninety-six, the additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the encouragement of learning, and erecting schools in the several counties within this province, the bill authorising a lottery in Havre-de-Grace for the purpose therein mentioned, the bill to incorporate the Maryland insurance company, the bill for erecting a bridge over the Eastern Branch of Patowmack river, the bill to repeal the act of assembly therein mentioned, and the bill to lay out and open a road from the crossing place on Little Monocacy to Zachariah Maccubbin's mill on Seneca, and from thence to intersect the main road leading from Frederick-town to Georgetown and the city of Washington at or near the place called Log-town, were sent to the senate by the clerk.

Mr. Jacques, Mr. T. Worthington and Mr. Gale, appeared in the house.

Mr. Hopewell, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to an act to regulate the inspection of tobacco, and to continue certain parts of the said act, and the supplementary acts thereto; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The report on the petition of Emory Suller, and wife, was read the second time, and the question put, That the house assent to the resolution therein contained? Determined in the negative.
