The report on the petition of Ciney Welsh was read the second time, concurred with, and leave given to bring in a bill pursuant thereto. ORDERED, That Mr. J. C. Thomas, Mr. Hopewell and Mr. Ridout, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a further supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the preservation of the breed of fish in Patuxent river. ORDERED, That Mr. Calvert, Mr. Hall, Mr. Baker, Mr. Brome and Mr. William Thomas, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The bill for the relief of Benjamin Moreton, of Baltimore county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate, with the bill to confirm the title of Levin Irving and Samuel Smylie to the lands therein mentioned, by the clerk.

On the second reading the bill to ascertain the allowance to jurymen and witnesses of the general courts, and the several county courts of this state, the question was put, That each jurymen attending the county court be allowed the sum of one dollar and thirty-three cents per day?
