THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolution respecting the purchase of the barracks in Frederick county, the bill to prevent logs and geese going at large in the town of William's Port, in Washington county, the bill to make valid the title of John Steele to the real property therein mentioned, the bill to authorize and empower the levy court of Harford county, at their discretion, to levy a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned, the resolution in favour of John Moore, the bill to make valid the title of John Frederick Magnus Amelung, of Frederick county, to part of a tract or parcel of land therein mentioned, the bill for the benefit of Richard Ireland Jones, of Queen-Anne's county, and the bill to prevent the firing of woods in the several counties in this state therein mentioned, with the message respecting the same, were sent to the senate by the clerk.

Petitions from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, praying a repeal of the act passed last session respecting a road which passes near the buildings of Ezekiel Towson, were preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

A petition from sundry creditors of Oliver Pomponian, counter to his petition, was preferred, and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

Mr. Nicholson, from the committee, brings in and delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Joseph Forrest, of George-town, Patowmack, and Thomas Earle, of Queen-Anne's county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill to empower Hardage Lane, of Montgomery county, seasonally to remove his slaves from the state of Virginia to this state. ORDERED, That Mr. Rogers, Mr. Riley and Mr. R. Magruder, be a committee to prepare and bring in the
