The committee beg leave to state, that owing to a change of the commissioners of the tar-and from the opinion entertained by the former commissioners their powers were totally suf-pended by the new appointment, they delayed coming to a settlement with the memorialist while in the time allowed him for the payment of the money to the state, but it appears to the com-mittee the neglect or misconduct of the public efficient of the state ought not to justify the retaining of money which should never have been paid; they therefore submit the following refor

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Robert Amoss, collector of the public tax in Harford county for the years seventeen hundred and eighty-three and seventeen hundred and eighty-five, the fum of two hundred and twenty-nine pounds thirteen shilling and eleven-pence, with interest from the time he closed the account against him, together with ten per cent. on the faid two hundred and twenty-nine pounds thirteen shillings and eleven-

pence.
