The bill respecting writs of habeas corpus, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

The amendments to the supplement to an act, entitled, An act for building a new gaol in Baltimore county, were read the second time, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

A petition from Richard Forrest, of Prince-George's county, praying an act of insolvency, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.
