A petition from Sarah and Anne Hynson, of Kent county, praying an act may pass to enable them to raise by lottery a sum of money, not exceeding 8,340 dollars, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Wroth, Mr. Barroll and Mr. Tilghman, to consider and report thereon.
