THE committee to whom was referred the memorial of Vachel Stevens, examiner-general of the western shore, have attentively considered the same, and are of opinion that the fees allowed are inadequate to the duties of the office; they therefore recommend that some further provision be made by law in favour of the memorialist, and that the act, entitled, An act to increase the fees of the examiner-general of the western shore, and the examiner of the eastern shore, be continued, and submit the propriety of the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That Vachel Stevens, examiner-general of the western shore, be directed to lay an account on oath of all fees of office by him received between the first day of January and the first day of November next, and that the treasurer of the western shore pay to said Vachel Stevens such sum of money, as, added to the amount of his fees, shall make up the sum of three hundred pounds current money.
