THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Thompson and Mr. Burgess. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

A petition from Robert Rolle, of Dorchester county, praying an act of insolvency, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

A petition from Richard G. Hardesty, and others, counter to the petition of Joseph Boarman, of Raphael, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Saint-Mary's county, praying an act may pass to lay out a road through the land of John Tippitt, and others, to intersect the main road from Chaptico to Saint-Joseph's chapel, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. W. Neale, Mr. Hebb and Mr. M'Pherson, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Montgomery county, praying an act may pass to confirm the location of certain land laid out for a village, adjacent to the court-house of said county, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Swearingen, Mr. T. Davis and Mr. Magruder, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Goldsborough appeared in the house.

A petition from Daniel M'Donnell, counter to the petition of Robert Rolle, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

Mr. Nelson, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the grand lodge of free and accepted masons in the state of Maryland; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

A petition from Jesse Tomlinson, of Allegany county, praying the state to relinquish her right to certain land purchased from a certain Evan Shelby, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Cresap, Mr. Simkins and Mr. Montgomery, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Charles-town, Charles county, praying an act may pass to prevent swine and geese going at large in said town, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Jones, Mr. Chapman and Mr. M'Pherson, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from Henry Roberts, praying to be admitted as a practicing attorney in the general court of the state, and the county courts of Baltimore and Harford, was preferred and read.

Mr. Lloyd, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to alter such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to voters, and the qualification of voters; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
