thousand eight hundred and two; they therefore submit the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That all proceedings against Charles Gardiner, of Charles county, on a judgment obtained against the faid Charles Gardiner, and others, for the recovery of the balance due by him to the flate of Maryland and they are hereby suspended until after the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and two, and that the said Charles Gardiner be and he is hereby indulged in the payment of the said balance till the period before mentioned; provided, that the judgment aforesaid shall continue and be in full force notwithstanding the suspension of proceedings directed by this resolution, and if the balance that will then be due on the aforesaid judgment be not paid by the time aforesaid, an execution may again be issued against the faid Charles Gardines to enforce the payment thereof.
