BY THE SENATE, DECEMBER 2, 1801.

WE have received your message of the 27th of November, requesting our reconsideration of the bill passed your house in favour of Henry Hagan, of Charles county, an insolvent debtor. We deemed a departure from a line of conduct we had determined to pursue, not to pass special insolvent laws in favour of any applicant, justifiable in the case of Joseph Forman, because his situation, in our judgment, demanded immediate relief, and as the usual provisions inserted in the annual insolvent laws of former sessions, and which it is more than probable will be contained in the law that will pass during the present session, were not calculated to extend to him that relief the legislature, on a due consideration of all circumstances were disposed to grant, a special law was indispensable. Henry Hagan, in our judgment, will be amply provided for by the insertion of his name in the bill containing the other applicants, and confidering the lateness of the session, it will not be long before that law will be presented for our consideration.
