

# VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1801.

Mr. Goldborough, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to declare the effect of judgments upon lands and tenements, and to direct the sheriffs in the service of executions, and for other purposes; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Scott, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act respecting public notaries in this state; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Goldborough, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Henry Troup; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Baltimore equitable society for insuring houses from loss by fire, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

The clerk of the senate delivers the resolution in favour of Elizabeth Rouse, endorsed; "By the senate, November 11, 1801: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Tilghman, Mr. Nelson and Mr. Denny, appeared in the house.

The bill for the relief of Patrick Dwier, of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

The report on the petition of William Ashmore was read the second time, the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from Sarah Turnbull and Joshua Bowen, of Baltimore county, praying the sheriff may be authorized to summon a jury to ascertain the damages which they have sustained by the turnpike road passing through their lands, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Moore, Mr. Stanbury and Mr. Lemmon, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. W. Dorsey, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to authorize the levy court of Anne-Arundel county to open the road therein mentioned; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

A petition from William Singleton and George Johnson, of Cæcil county, praying that the proceedings on a judgment obtained against them by the state may be suspended, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Miller, Mr. Van-Horn and Mr. Moffit, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from John Sprigg Belt, and others, securities of Robert Conn to William Alexander, collector of Anne-Arundel county, praying they may be authorized by law to collect the balances due the said collector, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. W. Dorsey, Mr. L. Dorsey and Mr. Ridgely, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from part of the inhabitants of Frederick county, praying a repeal of the law passed November session, 1800, respecting a road from the Federal city to Carlisle, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Nelson, Mr. Shriver and Mr. Hawkins, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from Elizabeth Chenowith, of Frederick county, praying to be authorized to dispose of part of the real estate of her deceased husband for the payment of his debts, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Nelson, Mr. Quinton and Mr. Hawkins, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of the east side of the river Monocacy, in Frederick county, praying an act may pass for laying off an additional election district in said county, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Nelson, Mr. Montgomery and Mr. Hawkins, to consider and report thereon.
