SATURDAY, December 12, 1801.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill to appoint an agent for the year 1802, was sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from sundry persons, counter to the petition of John League, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

The bill to authorise a lottery in Somerset county to raise a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

Petitions from Samuel Ferguson, of Washington county, John Peter Jennett, of Harford county, and Archibald Robinson, praying acts of insolvency, were preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

Petitions from sundry inhabitants of Montgomery and Anne-Arundel counties, praying an act may pass for opening a road from the city of Washington to Tancy-town, in Frederick county, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. T. Davis, Mr. Nelson, Mr. Stansbury, Mr. Shriver and Mr. Scott, to consider and report thereon.

The report on the petition of Elizabeth Townsend was read the second time, the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

The bill to extend the powers of the trustees of the poor of Montgomery county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from the hawkers and pedlers of the state of Maryland, counter to the petition of sundry inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

The bill to authorise the levy court of Anne-Arundel county to open the road therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Liberty-town, in Frederick county, praying a repeal of the law preventing geese and swine from going at large in said town, and that an act may pass enlarging the fines on said geese and swine, and to prevent their going at large within three miles of the said town, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Kemp, Mr. Nelson and Mr. Hawkins, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Hebb, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to streighten and amend the road leading from Leonard-town, in Saint-Mary's county, to Newport, in Charles county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of the poor of Caroline county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

The bill authorising commissioners to make alterations in the election districts, and the places of holding elections, in the several counties therein mentioned, was read the second time, and the question put, That the said bill do pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:
