

Mr. Keene, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to appoint a trustee to take care of that part of the Indian lands in Dorchester county which was laid off for, and occupied by, a certain Molley Mulberry, lately deceased; which was read the first and second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

On the second reading of the bill relative to the stock of the bank of England belonging to the state of Maryland, it was proposed that the following proviso be stricken out of the said bill: "Provided always, and be it enacted, that on the transfer of the said bank stock to the said minister, he be authorized and requested to transfer to Samuel Chase, agent of this state for the recovery of the said bank stock, or his order, four per centum in bank stock on the amount which hath been or may be transferred to the said minister for the use of this state; and also to pay to the said agent, or his order, the like per centum on the amount of any dividends due on the said stock, and not invested, and which have been or may be received by the said minister for the use of this state."

The previous question being called for and put, That the said question be now put? Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, That Samuel Chase, Esquire, agent for the state, be heard at the bar of the house? Resolved in the affirmative.

On progression in reading the said bill, the question was put, That the following proviso be stricken out? "Provided always, and be it enacted, that on the transfer of the said bank stock to the said minister, he be authorized and requested to transfer to Samuel Chase, agent of this state for the recovery of the said bank stock, or his order, four per centum in bank stock on the amount which hath been or may be transferred to the said minister for the use of this state; and also to pay to the said agent, or his order, the like per centum on the amount of any dividends due on the said stock, and not invested, and which have been or may be received by the said minister for the use of this state?" The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:
