M O N D A Y, November 8, 1802.

THE house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. Mr. Edward Lloyd and Mr. William Rose, two delegates returned for Talbot county, and Mr. John Forwood, a delegate returned for Harford county, appeared, and after qualifying in the mode prescribed by the constitution and form of government, and taking the oath to support the constitution of the United States, took their seats in the house.

The bill for the relief of John Erskine, of Talbot county, was sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from George Winter, of Allegany county, praying an act may pass authorising the clerk of said county to record a deed from John Crislor to him, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Cresap, Mr. Bayard and Mr. Simkins, to consider and report thereon.

A report from the president and trustees of Charlotte-Hall school, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. P. Stuart, Mr. Chapman, Mr. R. Neale, Mr. Grahame and Mr. Wood, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from Samuel Veazey, of Worcester county, praying to be divorced from his wife, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Chapman, Mr. Wilson, Mr. Nelson, Mr. Purnell and Mr. P. Stuart, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, praying certain nuisances may be removed from that part of the county near the precincts of the city of Baltimore, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Purviance, Mr. Stansbury, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Shriver and Mr. Lemmon, to consider and report thereon.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill relative to the continuance of causes in the court of appeals, and to alter the time of holding the same. ORDERED, That Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Wilson and Mr. Ridgely, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

A representation from the trustees of Washington academy, in Somerset county, was preferred; read, and referred to Mr. Hyland, Mr. Wilson and Mr. Cresap, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from Philip Jenkins, of Anne-Arundel county, praying an act of insolvency, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

On the second reading of that part of the report of the committee of elections and privileges respecting Anne-Arundel county, agreeably to the order of the day, the question was put, That the house concur therewith? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:
