T H U R S D A Y, November 18, 1802.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Hatcheson and Mr. Thompson. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Daniel Sheredine, a delegate returned for Cæcil county, appeared, and after qualifying in the mode prescribed by the constitution and form of government, and taking the oath to support the constitution of the United States, took his seat in the house.

A petition from William Elliott, of Prince-George's county, praying that a law may pass enabling him to hold real property in Maryland, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Bowie, Mr. Van-Horn and Mr. Carr, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from Robert Wade, of Prince-George's county, praying that a sum of money may be levied on said county for his support, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Bowie, Mr. Van-Horn and Mr. Carr, to consider and report thereon.

Petitions from Dominick Jordon, Alexander Martin, Alexander Kinny, Robert Colegate, William Jacob, John M. Coy, Owen Allen, William Parsons and David Poe, of the city of Baltimore, praying acts of insolvency, were preferred; read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

A petition from Henry Brown, of Baltimore county, counter to the petition of sundry inhabitants of the city and precincts of Baltimore, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on the petition which it is counter.

The report on the petition of William Gardiner was read the second time, the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

The report on the petition of Charles Gardiner was read the second time, the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from Polly Gordy, of Worcester county, praying that a law may pass enabling her to bring a negro from the state of Delaware into the state of Maryland, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Wilson, Mr. Frisby and Mr. Quinton, to consider and report thereon.

On motion, the question was put on the following resolution, viz.

RESOLVED, That a committee, consisting of five members, be appointed by this house to confer with a committee of the Susquehanna canal company now attending at the bar of this house, and that the said committee appointed by this house, report to this house the result of said conference.
