T H U R S D A Y, November 25, 1802.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. A memorial from sundry inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, counter to the petition of Fordom Pease, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

A petition from William Meley, of Talbot county, praying a resolution may pass directing a stay of proceeding on his bonds given to the state, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Rose, Mr. Martin and Mr. Lloyd, to consider and report thereon.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act to appoint and authorise commissioners to review and lay out the road therein mentioned in Harford county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from Rebecca Offutt, and others, of Montgomery county, praying that a law may pass relinquishing to them the right of the state to part of a tract of land called Douls Park, lying in Montgomery county, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Van-Horn, Mr. Swearingen and Mr. Dorsey, to consider and report thereon.

The supplement to an act, entitled, An act to authorise the laying out a public road from Thomas Underhill's mill to intersect the road leading from John Neal's to John Cox's, in Harford county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

Mr. Blake and Mr. Carr have leave of absence for a few days.

Mr. Tilghman, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to open a road from Hancock-town, in Washington county, by William Tong's mill, to intersect a road leading from Cumberland, in Allegany county, to Sidling Hill creek; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the senate delivers the resolution in favour of Charles Gardiner, and the resolution in favour of William Gardiner, severally endorsed; "By the senate, November 18, 1802: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

A petition from Edward Norwood, of Baltimore county, praying that a law may pass enabling certain commissioners to lay out and open the road leading from Baltimore to Elk-Ridge landing, and from thence to the city
