S A T U R D A Y, December 11, 1802.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Kemp, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to prevent hogs going at large in the town of Emmitsburg, in Frederick county; which was read the first and second time by special order, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

Petitions from Thomas Paul, of Baltimore county, James Johnson, of Harford county, and William Gibbons, of the city of Baltimore, praying acts of insolvency, were preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

The following message being prepared, was read, agreed to, and sent to the senate, with the bill to alter and change the name of John Mills, of Anne, of Dorchester county, into the name of Crawford, by the clerk.

By THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 11, 1802.

GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE,

FROM a supposition that your negating the bill, entitled, An act to alter and change the name of John Mills, of Anne, of Dorchester county, into the name of Crawford, was owing to your not being informed of circumstances which were brought under the notice of this house, and, no doubt, influenced them in the passage of the bill, we take the liberty of returning it for your reconsideration. When the bill was under the consideration of this house, it was stated, although that fact was omitted to be mentioned in the petition of said Mills, that some property, the amount of which was not known, had been left to him by a certain Wallace Crawford, deceased, on condition of his changing his name as prayed for by him. Had this information been communicated to you before you acted upon the bill in question, we feel an assurance that so reasonable an application would not have been rejected by you, and we trust that you will feel no aversion to the trouble of reconsidering the subject, in order to gratify a fellow citizen in a measure which affects his interest and his happiness, from which no possible injury can result to any other person, or to the community, and of which we recollect no instance of a refusal heretofore under similar circumstances.

On motion, ORDERED, That Mr. Bowie and Mr. Harwood be added to the committee appointed on the petition of the securities of Thomas Williams.

A petition from the commissioners and sundry inhabitants of Elizabeth-town, in Washington county, praying an act may pass authorising them to raise by lottery the sum of two thousand dollars, for the purpose of repairing the streets of said town, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Kershner, Mr. Tilghman and Mr. S. Frazier, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from Patrick Murdock, of Allegany county, praying that the money which he heretofore paid for lot No. 3876, lying westward of Fort Cumberland, may be refunded to him, with interest thereon, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Simkins, Mr. Cresap and Mr. Nelson, to consider and report thereon.

A representation from the visitors of Allegany county school, stating that the said school is in a flourishing situation, and praying the further aid of the legislature, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Simkins, Mr. Nelson and Mr. Bayard, to consider and report thereon.

The bill for the relief of Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, was read the second time and passed with the following amendments.

Amendments proposed. After the word "thereof" in the third line from the bottom of the second page insert the words "prior to the passage of this act."

The report on the petition of Thomas Amos, of Harford county, was read the second time, the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, praying to be incorporated by the name of The Second Presbyterian Congregation of the City of Baltimore, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Dickson, Mr. Ridgely, Mr. Purviance, Mr. Lemmon and Mr. Love, to consider and report thereon.

The clerk of the senate delivers the supplement to the act, entitled, An act to lay out a road from Aquilla Tarman's tavern to Thomas Cockey's mill, and from the said mill to the road called The Deer Park Road, endorsed; "By the senate, November 16, 1802: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
