Mr. Veatch, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to extend the powers of the trustees of the poor of Montgomery county; which was read the first and second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

Petitions from John B. Darby, of Baltimore county, and Peter D. Goverts, of the city of Baltimore, praying acts of insolvency, were preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.
