

82 VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1802.

BY THE SENATE, DECEMBER 27, 1802.

GENTLEMEN OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES,

ON reconsideration of the bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act to regulate elections, we have adhered to the amendments proposed by us.

We regret that your message on this subject assigns no reasons for the dissent therein expressed, and as the amendments proposed were suggested on great deliberation, and are, as we think, calculated to guard and secure the free exercise of the right of suffrage, we hope you will, on reconsideration, concur with us and pass the bill as amended.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 29, 1802.

GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE,

WE have taken your message under consideration, and as it is conceived by this house that it is important that an assessment law should pass this session, we have therefore acceded to the proposition contained in your answer to our message to have a conference on this subject, in hopes that the concurrence of the two houses may be obtained; for this purpose we have appointed Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Nelson, Mr. Stansbury, Mr. Bayard and Mr. Moore, as a committee to confer on the amendments proper to be adopted to the bill for the valuation of real and personal property in this state.
