The following resolutions being propounded to the house, were read the first and second time, assented to, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

Whereas by the act of congress, passed on the third day of March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-five, four thousand five hundred copies of the laws of the United States were directed to be published and distributed among the respective states, in such manner as the several legislatures or executives thereof should deem most conducive to the general information of the people, and there being three hundred and eighty of the said copies assigned for the use of this state; therefore RESOLVED, That the governor and council send five copies of the said laws to the several county clerks, to be delivered by them, one copy thereof to each of the associate justices of the county court, another copy to the sheriff, another copy to the register of wills, for the use of the orphans courts, and one copy to be kept in their respective offices for the use of the county courts.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the governor and council deliver, or cause to be delivered, a copy of the said laws to each member of the general assembly, to each judge of the general court, and to each chief justice of the county courts; to the chancellor one copy; to the judges of the high court of appeals, each one copy; to the clerk
