A memorial from sundry inhabitants of the county and city of Baltimore, praying an act may pass authorising certain commissioners to purchase ground, and erect the necessary buildings thereon, at the west end of the said city, for a public market-house, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Shriver, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Van-Horn, Mr. Lannon, Mr. Ridgely, Mr. Dickson and Mr. Dugan, to consider and report thereon.

The report of the trustees of Washington academy was referred to Mr. Carroll, Mr. Hyland and Mr. Wilson, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from the trustees of the impartial free-school of the city of Baltimore, praying an act may pass authorising them to raise by lottery the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, for the purpose of putting the same out on interest for the use of said school, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Dugan, Mr. Alexander and Mr. Harwood, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Dugan has leave of absence for a few days.

The report of the trustees of Charlotte-Hall school was sent to the senate by the clerk.

Petitions from Jeremiah Gilbert and Joshua Stevenson, of Frederick county, praying acts of insolvency, were preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

Mr. Veatch, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to declare a part of the old road leading from the mouth of Monocacy to George-town, in Montgomery county, a public highway; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill for the relief of Samuel Nicholls, an insolvent debtor of Talbot county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.
