A petition from Thomas Bale Randall, of the city of Baltimore, stating that he, with a number of the inhabitants of Baltimore county, heretofore filed their petition in this house, praying that the proceedings of the commissioners appointed to lay out a road from Gravel hill to Randall's-town, and from thence to the Frederick counwline, may be made null and void, now praying that he may be heard by counsel at the bar in support of the said petition, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Ridgely, Mr. Harwood and Mr. Lemmon, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, praying an act may pass for condemning a lot of ground belonging to Thorowgood Smith, so that they may get to a bridge, commonly called Peters's Bridge, extending from Water-street to King-George's-street, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Dugan, Mr.

Dickson and Mr. Harwood, to consider and report thereon.

Petitions from George Callodon and Bartholomew Donavan, of Baltimore county, and James Duly, of Harford county, praying acts of insolvency, were preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on pe-

utions of a similar nature.

Determined in the negative. On further progression in reading the said bill, the question was put, That the words " the first Monday of pril" in the ninetcenth section be stricken out of the said bill? Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put, That the words "the first Monday of June" be inserted in the said bill? Re-

olved in the affirmative.

ORDERED, That the further consideration of the said bill be postponed till to-morrow.
