A petition from sundry inhabitants of Cæcil county, praying an act may pass for opening a road from Octorara forge in the nearest and best rout to Creswell's ferry on the Susquehanna river, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Sheredine, Mr. Miller and Mr. Veazey, to consider and report thereon.

The bill for the relief of Christopher Woolford, of Washington county, was read the second time, passed,

and sent to the senate by the clerk.
