THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.
 The bill to erect a bridge over the river Patapsco, the resolution respecting the treasury, the resolution re-
 specting William Amos, senior, and the resolution respecting the western boundary of this state and Virginia,
 were sent to the senate by the clerk.
 Mr. Hatcheson appeared in the house.
 A petition from Fordom Pease, of the city of Baltimore, praying that his name may not be stricken out of
 the insolvent bill, was preferred and read.
 The bill to authorise the levy court of Anne-Arundel county to assess and levy a sum of money for the pur-
 poses therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.
 The following resolutions being propounded to the house, were read the first and second time, assented to,
 and sent to the senate by the clerk.
 Whereas many persons, both officers and privates, who rendered services on board the barges and look-out
 boats, (during the late war,) in the service of this state, have received no compensation for the same; therefore,
RESOLVED, That the auditor of this state be and he is hereby authorised and directed to liquidate the accounts
 of all officers and privates who served on board the several barges and look-out boats during the late war, and
 upon their proving, to his satisfaction, by indifferent testimony, that they have performed the services for which
 they severally claim a compensation, which shall be attested by the oath of the claimant, that he hath not re-
 ceived any part thereof more than is credited, if any, that he shall allow their accounts respectively.
RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to all and every officer and private who served on
 board any of the barges or look-out boats during the late war, the amount of their accounts respectively, when
 allowed by the auditor, out of any unappropriated monies remaining in the treasury.
 A petition from Alexander Furnival, of the city of Baltimore, praying an act of insolvency, was preferred
 and read.
 On motion, **ORDERED**, That the committee of claims be directed to close the journal of accounts up to Sun-
 day next inclusive.
ORDERED, That the committee of claims bring in a bill for the payment of the journal of accounts.
 A petition from sundry inhabitants of New-Market, in Dorchester county, praying that the levy court of said
 county may be invested with full power to appoint a person to act as bailiff in said village, was preferred and
 read.
 On motion, the question was put, That the further consideration of the bill respecting taxes on judicial pro-
 ceedings, and on proceedings in the land-office, and for other purposes, be postponed till the next session of as-
 sembly? Resolved in the affirmative.
 The bill for the benefit of Arthur Thompson, of Saint-Mary's county, was read the second time, passed, and
 sent to the senate by the clerk.
 The following resolution being propounded to the house was read.
RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised and required to subscribe
 during the ensuing year, on the part and in behalf of the state of Maryland, as many of the reserved shares in
 the bank of Baltimore as there shall be unappropriated money in the treasury sufficient to meet the payment
 thereof; and the said treasurer is hereby further authorised and required to pay the directors of the bank of Bal-
