**T**HE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Potter and Mr. Holbrook. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. William Miller, a delegate returned for Cæcil county, appeared, and after qualifying in the mode prescribed by the constitution and form of government, and taking an oath to support the constitution of the United States, took his seat in the house.

Petitions from Ninian Cockran, of Allegany county, Richard G. Hardesty, of Prince-George's county, and John Harper, of the city of Baltimore, praying acts of insolvency, were preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

A petition from Mary Dearnott, of Harford county, praying that a sum of money may be levied on said county for her support, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Bond and Mr. Ayres, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Harford county, praying that a law may pass to lay out a road from Clarke's store, on the Rock Run road, thence by Austin's mill to intersect the main road leading from Belle-Air to Havre-de-Grace near Stump's old fields, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Ayres and Mr. Bond, to consider and report thereon.
