time by especial order and passed.

Mr. W. Mossitt, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the benefit of Margaretta Chalmers; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

WE have rejected the bill, entitled, An act to pay the civil list, and other expenses of civil government, because we are not satisfied with the increase of certain salaries therein mentioned. If you will send us a bill with the same salaries as are provided by the law passed last year, it will meet our approbation. We are of opinion that at this particular period, when a considerable diminution has taken place in the price of the principal articles of living, that we ought not to reduce the funds of the state by an augmentation of salaries, especially as the time may be fast approaching when there may be a necessity for the most rigid economy to enable us to meet the exigency of events.
