On motion by Mr. Boyle, the following resolutions were read.

RESOLVED, by the general assembly of Maryland, That our senators in congress be instructed, and our representatives requested, and they are hereby so instructed and requested, to use all proper means and exertions to procure the passing a law establishing weights and measures.

RESOLVED, That the governor be and he is hereby requested to transmit these resolutions to the senators and representatives of this state when in congress assembled.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

S A T U R D A Y, November 25, 1809.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill to prevent insurance by foreigners, was sent to the senate.

Mr. Harryman delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of the eastern precincts of Baltimore, praying that the road from North-street to the Harford road, may be condemned and kept up as a public road; which was read and referred to Mr. Harryman, Mr. Randall and Mr. M. Brown, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Belt delivers a petition from Gassaway Watkins, a revolutionary officer; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

Mr. Harryman delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, counter to a petition for a road from the end of the Falls Turnpike road to Black Rock Mills; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

Mr. J. Thomas delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county, praying for a turnpike road from Westminster to Hagar's-town; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on a petition of a similar nature.

Mr. Stuart delivers a petition from William Bruce, of Charles county, an old soldier; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

Mr. Baer delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick-town, praying for a lottery for the purpose of paving Market-street in said town; which was read and referred to Mr. Baer, Mr. Schley and Mr. J. Thomas, to consider and report thereon.

Also a petition from Mary O'Ferroll, of Frederick county, praying she may be authorised to retail spirituous liquors without license for the same; which was read and referred to Mr. Baer, Mr. Schley and Mr. J. Thomas, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Groome delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Cæcil county, praying for a bridge over Susquehanna river; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Schley delivers a petition from Elizabeth Philpott, of Frederick county, praying she may be authorised to sell part of the real estate of her deceased husband; which was read and referred to Mr. Schley, Mr. J. Thomas and Mr. J. H. Thomas, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Schley delivers the bill to make the final discharge of executors, administrators and guardians, matter of record, as amended; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill to authorise the levy court of Washington county to appoint commissioners to lay off the road therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.
