

MONDAY, December 4, 1809.

THE house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. The bill for the support of John Sowers, of Baltimore county, was sent to the senate.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, praying that insurance on lottery tickets may be prohibited; which was read and referred to Mr. Bland, Mr. Worthington and Mr. Harryman, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. S. Thomas delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Maryland, praying for a turnpike road from near Ellicott's mill to the territory of Columbia, in a direction towards George-town; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Physick delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Cæcil county, praying that bank stock may be taxed; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Worthington delivers a petition from Henry Alexander, of the city of Baltimore, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Mr. Worthington, Mr. Bland and Mr. Randall, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Physick delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Cæcil county, praying for a road from the Rising Sun to Charles-town; which was read and referred to Mr. Physick, Mr. J. S. Moffitt and Mr. Veazey, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Worthington delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of the western precincts of the city of Baltimore, praying for a lottery for the purpose of erecting a town clock; which was read and referred to Mr. Worthington, Mr. Bland and Mr. Randall, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Worthington delivers a petition from Mary Quinan, of the city of Baltimore, praying a divorce; which was read and referred to Mr. Worthington, Mr. Tabbs and Mr. Randall, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Randall delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, counter to the petition praying that the criminals may be employed on the Philadelphia road; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on the petition to which it is counter.

Mr. Archer delivers a petition from Samuel Gover, and others, praying that a suit may be reinstated in the court of appeals; which was read and referred to Mr. Archer, Mr. Streett, Mr. J. E. Spencer, Mr. C. Dorsey and Mr. Winder, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Stevens delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of James Doores, of Talbot county; which was read the first and second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of Garret E. Pendergast, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative, and the bill sent to the senate.

Mr. Harryman delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of the western precincts of Baltimore, praying that commissioners may be appointed to grade and level the streets, squares, lanes and alleys, and to fix and establish the corners thereof; which was read and referred to Mr. Harryman, Mr. Worthington, Mr. M. Brown, Mr. Randall and Mr. Bland, to consider and report thereon.

The bill to improve a road in Baltimore county, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Seth delivers a petition from the constables of Talbot county, praying a further allowance as bailiffs; which was read and referred to Mr. Seth, Mr. Stevens and Mr. P. Spencer, to consider and report thereon.

On motion by Mr. C. Dorsey, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to repeal all such laws as require the payment to the state of twenty five shillings for a license to marry. ORDERED, That Mr. C. Dorsey, Mr. Seth and Mr. Wilson, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Davis has leave of absence. The house resumed the consideration of the resolutions disapproving of the resolutions of November session, 1808, relative to the embargo, and after sometime spent in debating the same,
