

The bill to alter such parts of the constitution and form of government of this state as relate to voters and qualification of voters, the bill for the benefit of the children of John Green, late of Dorchester county, deceased, the bill annulling the marriage of Ephraim Furniss, and Polly his wife, of Somerset county, the resolution relative to the road from Hancock to Cumberland, and the message proposing to close the session, were sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Archer, ORDERED, That the further additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to direct descents, have a second reading on Tuesday next, and that the bill to alter all such parts of the declaration of rights, constitution and form of government, as make it lawful to lay a general and equal tax for the support of the Christian religion, have a second reading on Wednesday next.

On motion by Mr. J. Brown, ORDERED, That the bill for the regulation of officers fees, have a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Worthington delivers a memorial from William Gwynn, of the city of Baltimore, praying that part of lot number eleven may be conveyed to him by Baltimore county on his paying for the same; which was read and referred to Mr. Worthington, Mr. Harryman, Mr. Kerr, Mr. Randall and Mr. M. Brown, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Kerr delivers the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred the memorial of the trustees of the Easton Charity School, beg leave to report, that they have taken the same under their consideration, and are of opinion that the prayer of the memorialists is reasonable, and ought to be granted; they therefore submit the following resolution:

Moffitt delivers a petition from John Moor, of Kent county, praying to be compensated for losses sustained by fire, which he supposes to have arisen from the malice of some person in consequence of the discharge of his duty as a magistrate; which was read and referred to Mr. W. Moffitt, Mr. Angier and Mr. Harris, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from the president and managers of the Frederick turnpike company, praying that they may be authorised to collect tolls for crossing a bridge over Monocacy; which was read and referred to Mr. Bland, Mr. Winder, Mr. Baer, Mr. Tabbs and Mr. J. E. Spencer, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Streett delivers the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred the petition of George W. Bradford, of Harford county, have taken the same into consideration, and find the facts therein stated to be true, and are of opinion that the prayer of the petitioner is reasonable and ought to be granted; they therefore beg leave to recommend the following resolution:

On motion by Mr. Randall, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to complete the Baltimore and Liberty-town road. ORDERED, That Mr. Randall, Mr. Harryman, Mr. M. Brown, Mr. J. H. Thomas, Mr. Schley, Mr. Baer and Mr. Tabbs, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. J. H. Thomas delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising George Creager, jun. late sheriff of Frederick county, to complete his collection; which was read the first and second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Angier delivers a bill, entitled, An act annulling the marriage of John Lamb and Elizabeth Lamb; and Mr. Worthington delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Thomas Carnan, of the city of Baltimore; which were read.

Mr. C. Dorsey delivers a bill, entitled, An act to repeal all such parts of the acts of assembly of this state as require the payment of twenty-five shillings for a marriage license, and a bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act respecting the equity jurisdiction of the county courts; which were read, and ordered to have a second reading on Friday next.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to admit persons conscientiously scrupulous of taking an oath to serve as jurors, and the bill to authorise the drawing of a lottery or lotteries in Middle-town, in Frederick county, severally endorsed, "will pass."
