On motion by Mr. Wilkinson, the question was put, That the following be stricken out of the sixth clause? "4th. Every person or persons duly convicted of wilfully and maliciously stabbing, killing or destroying, any horse or mare, gelding, colt, ass or mule, not the property of such person, and not in the act of trespassing on his enclosures, shall undergo a confinement in the penitentiary-house for a period not less than one year nor more than four years, to be treated as herein after directed." Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Bland, the further consideration of the same was postponed until to-morrow.

T U E S D A Y, December 19, 1809.

**T**HE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Wharton and Mr. Hebb appeared in the house.

The bill to authorise and empower the justices of the levy court of Dorchester county to assess and levy a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned, and the bill to widen a road in Frederick county, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Tabbs delivers a petition from Peregrine Fitzhugh, a revolutionary officer; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

Mr. Blake delivers a petition from George W. Ireland, late sheriff of Calvert county, praying a further time to complete his collection; which was read and referred to Mr. Blake, Mr. Grahame and Mr. Hebb, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Gaither delivers a petition from Thomas Nicholls, of Montgomery county, praying to be compensated for building a bridge over Seneca branch; which was read and referred to Mr. Gaither, Mr. Wharton and Mr. Veatch, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Bayard delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Allegany county, praying that the bounty for killing wolves may be increased; which was read and referred to Mr. Bayard, Mr. Hilleary and Mr. Cresap, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Worthington delivers a petition from the trustees of the Methodist Episcopal Church on Fell's Point, in the city of Baltimore, praying they may be authorised to sell part of the property thereof; which was read and referred to Mr. Worthington, Mr. J. E. Spencer and Mr. Bland, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Randall delivers a petition from sundry officers and privates of the battalion commanded by major William Nace, of Baltimore county, praying to be exempted from attending regimental meetings; which was read and referred to Mr. Randall, Mr. M. Brown, Mr. Winder, Mr. Harryman and Mr. Bland, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Williams delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising Joseph M'Geney, late sheriff of Anne-Arundel county, to complete his collection; Mr. M. Brown delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising the levy court of Baltimore county to levy a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned; Mr. J. Thomas delivers a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate companies to make several turnpike roads through Baltimore county, and for other purposes; Mr. Archer delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of John H.
