Mr. Wilkinson delivers a petition from Richard Mackall, surviving executor of Benjamin Mackall, of Calvert county, praying that the money received for the sale of William and Robert Molleson's confiscated property may be applied to the discharge of their debts; which was read and referred to Mr. Wilkinson, Mr. Chapman and Mr. Herbert, to consider and report thereon.

On motion by Mr. Harryman, the following message was read, agreed to, and with the bill therein mentioned, sent to the senate.

Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to appoint commissioners to grade and level the several streets, squares, lanes and alleys, in the precincts of Baltimore, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The resolution in favour of Ninian Pinkney, and the resolution relative to a road in Baltimore and Harford counties, endorsed, "assented to." And the following message:
