On motion by Mr. Dennis, the question was put, That the following be inserted at the end of the bill? to wit: "And be it enacted, That nothing contained in the seventh section shall be construed to extend to lands, tenements and hereditaments, to be seized, taken or sold, by virtue of any warrant or process issued by any justice of the peace for the recovery of any small debt, account or demand, which by the laws of this state, may be sued for and recovered by warrant before a justice of the peace." Determined in the negative.

SATURDAY, November 24, 1810.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Ephraim K. Wilson, a delegate returned for Worcester county, appeared, and after qualifying in the mode prescribed by the constitution and form of government, and taking an oath to support the constitution of the United States, took his seat in the house.

The report on the petition of Vachel Burgess, was read the second time, and the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill authorising Rasin Gale, of Kent county, late sheriff and collector, to complete his collection, the bill authorising Isaac S. White, late sheriff and collector of Washington county, to complete his collection, the bill authorising Daniel Ballard, late sheriff of Somerset county, to complete his collection, severally endorsed, "will not pass." The bill to lay out and make public a road in Anne-Arundel county, and the bill for the benefit of the infant children of James Wilson Perry, of Montgomery county, deferred, severally endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, agreed to, and the bills ordered to be engrossed. Also a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the sheriffs and collectors of the several counties of this state to complete their collections, and a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of George Stine, of the city of Baltimore, severally endorsed, "will pass;" which were read.
