Mr. Brooke delivers the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred the memorial of Jacob Eversole, of Frederick county, having taken the same into consideration, and finding the facts therein stated to be true, are of opinion that the prayer of the said memorialist is reasonable and ought to be granted; they therefore submit to the consideration of the house the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Jacob Eversole, or his order, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, the sum of sixty-nine pounds nine shillings and ten-pence, with interest thereon from the thirteenth day of June, eighteen hundred and eight, until the time of passing this resolution, in full satisfaction of a decree obtained by him in the high court of chancery against the state of Maryland.

Which was read the first and second time by especial order, the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Jackson, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act declaring the effect of decisions in cases of petition for freedom. ORDERED, That Mr. Jackson, Mr. Wilson and Mr. Dennis, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Moses Brown, a delegate returned for Baltimore county, appeared, and after qualifying in the mode prescribed by the constitution and form of government, and taking an oath to support the constitution of the United

States, took his seat in the house.

The house, according to the order of the day, proceeded to the second reading of the bill to establish a bank, and incorporate a company, under the name of the Elkton Bank of Maryland, and on motion by Mr. Archer, the question was put, That the following be added to the said bill? "And be it enacted, That the president and directors of said bank shall pay within two years after the same shall go into operation, to the treasurer of the state, the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, and if the same be not paid within the time aforesaid, then this law shall expire and all the provisions thereof." Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass? The year and nays being required, appeared as follow:

If the house of delegates will originate a resolution, directing the payment by the treasurer of ive years full pay as a captain in our late revolutionary war, without any interest thereon, in full of all claims he may have for his commutation pay, it will meet with the concurrence of the senate. Which was read.
