On motion by Mr. Perry, the question was put, That the words " provided that nothing in this act contained : shall subject to sale any lands heretofore granted by the state of Maryland to the officers and soldiers, where the same remain in the possession of the original grantees, or their heirs, under devise or by descent," be stricken out of the 46th clause, for the purpose of inserting the following words: " and may be collected in the same manner as the county charges of said county are collected." Determined in the negative.

The bill being read throughout, on motion by Mr. M'Pherson, the question was put, That the further consideration of the same be referred to the next general assembly? The year and nays being required, ap-

Mr. Eccleston delivers a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of Anthony Thompson; Mr. Rogerson delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Edward L. Miles; Mr. Harryman delivers a bill, entitled, An act to lay out a road in Baltimore county, and Mr. Swearingen delivers a bill, en-

titled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to open a road in Frederick county; which were read.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to confirm an act passed at November session, one thousand eight hundred and nine, entitled, An act to alter such parts of the constitution and form of government of this state as relate to voters and qualification of voters, the bill to lay out and open a certain road in Cæcil county, passed the third day of January, eightcen hundred and seven, the supplement to an act, entitled. An act to lay out and make public a road therein mentioned in Cæcil county, passed the sixth day of January, eighteen hundred and nine, and the further supplement to the act, entitled. An act for the amending, and reducing into system, the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, administrators and guardians, and the rights of orphans and other representatives of deceased persons, severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to open a road in Washington county, endorsed, " will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The bill respecting the registering of marriages, births and deaths, endorsed, "will not pass." The resolution in favour of Mountjoy Bayly, endorsed, "assented to." The resolution in favour of Vachel Burgess, endorsed, "dissented from." And the following message:

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

THE senate have dissented from the resolution in favour of Vachel Burgess, under an impression that the language of the resolution is not sufficiently explicit for the direction of the treasurer in adjusting the account to be submitted to him. If the house of delegates will originate a resolution, directing the payment by the treasurer of four years full pay, free from interest, it will meet with the concurrence of the senate.

Whereas it appears to this general assembly, that Vachel Burgess, a captain in the late revolutionary war, did not receive the commutation in lieu of the half pay for life promised to the officers and soldiers; therefore, RESOLVED. That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised and directed to pay to the had Vachel Burgess, four years full pay of a captain, free from interest, as a full compensation for his services during the late revolutionary war.
