M O N D A Y, December 3, 1810.

THE house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. The bill for the relief of John Norris, of Harford county, the bill for the relief of William Austin, the bill for the relief of John Murray, devisee of John Muir, the bill for the relief of John Carruthers, of the city of Baltimore, an insolvent debtor, the resolution in favour of Vachel Burgess, and the message relative thereto, were sent to the senate.

Mr. Bowles delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, stating that a large subscription had been made for the purpose of erecting an academy in Hagar's-town, and praying for an act of incorporation; which was read and referred to Mr. Bowles, Mr. T. Hall, Mr. Downey, Mr. Comegys and Mr. Gaither.

Mr. Jump delivers a bill, entitled, An act to alter and change a road in the village of Denton, in Caroline county; which was read the first and second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to preserve the breed of fish in Baltimore county, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill annulling the marriage of Ezekiel Walker and Anne Margaret Walker, of the city of Baltimore, endorsed, "will not pass." And the resolution in favour of Jacob Eversole, endorsed, "assented to."

Mr. Boyle delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Linney Conway, of Anne-Arundel county; which was read.

Mr. Emory delivers a petition from Philemon Murphy, crier of Queen-Anne's county court, praying that he may be allowed fees in cases where criminals are convicted; which was read and referred to Mr. Emory, Mr. Archer and Mr. Bland.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from Prudence Gough and James Carroll, of Baltimore county, praying they may be authorised to give deeds for part of the real estate of Harry Dorsey Gough; which was read and referred to Mr. Bland, Mr. Martin and Mr. Harryman.

On motion by Mr. Forwood, ORDERED, That the bill to withdraw the salaries from the militia officers and to make some provision for the privates, have a second reading on to-morrow.

On motion by Mr. Streett, ORDERED, That the bill to confirm a road in Harford and Baltimore counties therein mentioned, have a second reading on the 13th inst.

On motion by Mr. Bland, ORDERED, That the bill concerning insolvency, have a second reading on the 4th inst.

On motion by Mr. Bowles, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to pay the civil list and other expenses of civil government. ORDERED, That Mr. Bowles, Mr. Comegys and Mr. Harryman, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

On motion by Mr. Bowles, ORDERED, That this house will, on Thursday next, proceed to the appointment of a director to the Bank of Baltimore, on behalf of this state, for the ensuing year.

Mr. Bland delivers a bill, entitled, An act to enable Prudence Gough and James Carroll, executors of the last will and testament of Harry Dorsey Gough, to make deeds in certain cases therein mentioned; which was read.

The report on the petition of Aquila Jones, was read the second time, and the resolution therein contained assented to.

Mr. Wilson delivers a petition from Samuel T. Parker, of Worcester county, praying that a deed from George Smith to him may be confirmed; which was read and referred to Mr. Wilson, Mr. Handy and Mr. T. Williams.

Mr. Wainwright delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Talbot county, praying that a company may be incorporated to make a toll draw-bridge over Choptank river; which was read and referred to Mr. Wainwright, Mr. Emory, Mr. Stevens, Mr. Willis and Mr. Jump.
