T H U R S D A Y, December 6, 1810.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill to incorporate the stockholders in the Franklin Bank of Baltimore, the bill to reduce the per diem of the judges and clerks of elections in Allegany county, and the message relative thereto, were sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Bland, the following order was read and assented to: Whereas it is alleged by Doctor M. Littlejohn, that the indisposition of his family, and the situation of his business, render it extremely inconvenient for him to attend at the bar of this house as a witness in the case of Thomas Jones, Esquire; therefore, ORDERED, That John Gill, notary public, of the city of Baltimore, be and he is hereby appointed commissioner, with full power to examine and take the deposition of Doctor M. Littlejohn, the deposition so taken to be by him transmitted to this house on or before the tenth instant.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to alter and change a road in the village of Denton, in Caroline county, and a bill for the relief of Sarah Rimmer, of the city of Annapolis, severally endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, agreed to, and the bills ordered to be engrossed. And the bill for the relief of George Jones, of Kent county, an insolvent debtor, endorsed, "will not pass."

Mr. Streett delivers a bill, entitled, An act to lay out and open the road therein mentioned in Harford county; which was read.

The bill for the relief of Horatio Clagett, of Charles county, was read the second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Randall delivers a petition from Samuel Tschudy, of Baltimore county, on behalf of himself and his father, praying that Thomas Wilson and Samuel Harden may not be permitted to act as commissioners to lay out a road from the Franklin paper mills; which was read and referred to Mr. Randall, Mr. Harryman, Mr. M. Brown, Mr. Martin and Mr. Forwood.

Mr. Marriott delivers a petition from Philip Hopkins, of Anne-Arundel county, praying that a sum of money may be levied on said county for the support of Ally Askew; which was read and referred to Mr. Marriott, Mr. Belt and Mr. Warfield.

Mr. Bland delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Clotworthy Birnie.

Mr. Perry delivers a bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the valuation of real and personal property within this state, and Mr. Quinton delivers a bill, entitled, An act to prevent the erection of booths within two miles of any Methodist camp or quarterly meeting in Worcester county; which were read.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from Caroline Zollickoffer, of Frederick county, praying that she may be authorised to lay out five acres of land lying adjoining the city of Baltimore, into streets, lanes and alleys, and convenient building-lots; which was read and referred to Mr. Bland, Mr. Randall and Mr. Harryman.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from Mary Quinlan, praying a divorce; which was read and referred to Mr. Bland, Mr. Randall and Mr. Martin.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from Isaac and Andrew Hazlehurst, of the city of Baltimore, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Mr. Bland, Mr. Martin and Mr. Harryman.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from Elizabeth, John and Thomas M'Elderry, of the county of Baltimore, praying they may be authorised to carry into effect the contract made by Thomas M'Elderry, deceased, and to sell and lease part of his real estate; which was read and referred to Mr. Bland, Mr. Martin and Mr. Harryman.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from Michael Logan, of the city of Baltimore, counter to the petition of William Smith; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Archer delivers a petition from James M. Magness, praying a divorce; which was read and referred to Mr. Archer, Mr. Streett and Mr. Comegys.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from Caleb D. Goodwin and Thomas B. Dorsey, of the city of Baltimore, praying for a law to authorise the city commissioners to alter the course and widen Ten Feet Lane, in said city; which was read and referred to Mr. Bland, Mr. Martin and Mr. Randall.
