RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised and required, to pay unto Martha Mackellish, of Baltimore county, sister and heir at law of John Philips, the sum of two hundred and thirty-eight pounds nine shillings and two-pence, principal and interest, being the amount of the depreciation
