

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1810.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

WE return you the resolution in favour of Henry Leeke, an old revolutionary soldier, and hope upon a reconsideration you will assent to the same.

Mr. Gaither delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise and empower the levy court of Montgomery county to assess and levy a sum of money on the assessable property thereof for the purpose of building a clerk's office in said county; which was read.

The bill for the benefit of the heirs of John Brown Hackett, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Streett delivers the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred the petition of George W. Bradford, of Harford county, have taken the same into consideration, and find the facts therein stated to be true, and are of opinion that the prayer of the petitioner is reasonable and ought to be granted; they therefore beg leave to recommend the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore pay unto George W. Bradford, of Harford county, or order, the sum of forty-three pounds twelve shillings and three pence, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.

Which was read.

Mr. C. Hall delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Harriet G. Wynkoop; which was read.

The bill for the sale of part of the real estate of Lewis Belmear, late of Montgomery county, deceased, and the bill concerning a road therein mentioned in Harford county, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The house, according to the order of the day, proceeded to the second reading of the bill to confirm a road in Harford and Baltimore counties therein mentioned; on motion by Mr. Streett, the question was put, That the blank in the bill be filled up with the names of "William C. Goldsmith, Abraham Cole, John S. Belt, John Clendenen and William Whiteford?" Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill annulling the marriage of Thomas Taylor, and Phœbe his wife, the bill for the benefit of Doctor James Archer, of Claiborne county, in the territory of Mississippi, the bill to appoint Thomas Woodfield, of Anne-Arundel county, trustee for the sale of the real estate of Joshua Hall, late of said county, deceased, the further supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the valuation of real and personal property within this state, and the bill for founding an academy at Hagar's-town, in Washington county; severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to lay out and open a road therein mentioned in Harford county, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. And a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the stockholders of the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore, endorsed, "will pass;" which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill annulling the marriage of William Price, and Margaret his wife, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:
