MONDAY, December 17, 1810.

THE house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. The supplement to an act, entitled, An act to ascertain and establish a divisional line between Anne-Arundel and Calvert counties, and the message proposing to close the session, were sent to the senate.

The papers delivered by the clerk of the senate on Saturday were read, and the bills ordered to be engrossed. Mr. Emory delivers a bill, entitled, An act relating to costs in criminal cases, and repealing an act therein mentioned, and Mr. Boyle delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William Caton, of the city of Annapolis; which were read.

Mr. Emory delivers the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred the petition of Thomas Gadd, of Queen-Anne's county, an old revolutionary soldier, beg leave to report, that they have had the same under their consideration, and are of opinion that the prayer of the petitioner is just and reasonable and ought to be granted; therefore,

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised and directed to pay annually to Thomas Gadd, of Queen-Anne's county, an old revolutionary soldier, a sum of money equal to the half pay of a common soldier during the war aforesaid, as a further remuneration to the said Thomas Gadd for the services rendered his country, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.
