

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1810.

The bill to make valid the deed therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate. Mr. Wilson delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising the register of the land-office of the western shore to deliver certain papers to the agent of the state of Delaware; and Mr. Burgess delivers the bill for the relief of Solomon Sparks, William Stinson and Benjamin Hall, of Queen-Anne's county; which were read.

The bill authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose of making a permanent bridge over the river Monocacy, in Frederick county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Bland delivers a memorial from the commissioners of the penitentiary; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

The house resumed the consideration of the address relative to Zebulon Hollingsworth, Esquire, and the question was put, That the house assent to the same? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

The resolution relative to state debtors, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Brooke, ORDERED, That the bill to subject equitable estates in lands to sale under writs of fieri facias, have a second reading on Monday.

The house, according to the order of the day, proceeded to the second reading of the bill to vest in the people of this state the right to elect constables; on motion by Mr. Randall, the question was put, That the further consideration of the same be referred to the next general assembly? The bill to repeal an act, entitled, An act to clear and make public a road in Washington county, was read the second time, and, on motion by Mr. Downey, the question was put, That the same be postponed until Tuesday next? Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and sent to the senate.

The bill to ascertain and provide for the payment of certain damages sustained by John Logsdon, and others, of Frederick county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.
