FIVE O'CLOCK, P. M.

THE house met.

The bill authorising Philemon C. Blake, late sheriff of Queen-Anne's county to complete his collection, and the bill to authorise the levy court of Anne-Arundel county to assess and levy a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Archer, ORDERED, That the witnesses summoned by order of this house to give testimony on the subject of the report of the committee of grievances and courts of justice relative to Zebulon Hollingsworth, Esq. be and they are hereby discharged from further attendance, and that the committee of claims allow them the sum of two dollars and fifty cents for each days attendance on this house.

The bill to lay out and make public a road in Baltimore county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Davis, ORDERED, That the clerk prepare a list of all bills and resolutions on the table, and that they shall be called up in their order according to priority of dates, subject to the disposition of the house.

The bill for the relief of Thomas Karney, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the benefit of Elizabeth Reeder, daughter of Clare Reeder, of Saint-Mary's county, was read the second time and will not pass.

The bill for the benefit of Luther Martin, of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time and will not pass.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill for the relief of Francis C. Hall. of Queen-Anne's county, and the bill to incorporate the president and directors of the Athenian Society, severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill for the establishment of a school in Baltimore county by the name of Malin School, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The bill to regulate the inspection of lumber, and the bill to repeal the twentieth section of an act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road to lead from the cross roads near Richard Caton's lime-kiln, in Baltimore county, nearly in the direction of Jones's Falls, to the city of Baltimore, severally endorsed, "will not pass."

The bill for the relief of Henry Brown, of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. F. Hall, the following message was read.

By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, December 22, 1810.

The bill to repeal the twenty-first section of an act, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, passed at November session, eighteen hundred and five, was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. Wilson, the question was put, That the following be added to the said bill? "provided, that nothing in this act contained shall prevent the judges of any county court from discharging any insolvent debtor who may have already filed his petition for a discharge."
