The report in favour of Thomas Gadd, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The bill to empower a trustee to sell certain lands belonging to Anna Maria O'Brion, the supplement to the act authorising a lottery for raising a sum of money for erecting a building to be called The Baltimore Female Academy, the bill respecting the issuing of writs of execution out of the courts of appeals, and the bill for the relief of John Lyon, of Frederick county, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the better preservation of the public property, was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. Dorsey, the same was referred to the next general assembly.

The bill for the encouragement of Elijah Eleason, of Cæcil county, was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. F. Hall, the same was referred to the next general assembly.

The report to withdraw the several donations to the different academies in this state, was read the second time, and referred to the next general assembly.

The bill annulling the marriage of Thomas Meek, and Anne his wife, was referred to the next general assembly.

The bill for the relief of Charles Wallace, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The report on the petition of Sarah Easton and Dorothea Storer, was read the second time, the resolution therein contained assented to, and sent to the senate.

The reports on the petitions of Thomas Cockey and William Taylor, were read the second time and concurred with.

The supplement to an act to fix and establish Argyle-alley, and the bill relating to costs in criminal cases, and repealing an act therein mentioned, were referred to the next general assembly.

The report in favour of William Kilty, was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. Bland, the question was put, That the blank therein be filled up with 3000 dollars? Determined in the negative.

The question was put on 2000 dollars. Determined in the negative.

The question was put on 1800 dollars. Determined in the negative.

The question was then put on 1750 dollars. Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Dennis, the question was then put on 1600 dollars. The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow :
