The Speaker laid before the house reports of the clerks of the court of appeals for the western and castern shores, and of the clerks of the county courts of Anne-Arundel, Baltimore, Frederick, Harford, Montgomery, Allegany, Talbot and Caroline counties, relative to the attendance of the judges of those courts respectively.

The Speaker also laid before the house a report of the Cashier of the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore, exhibiting the state and condition of that institution on the 13th of November 1827, transmitted in obedience to a resolution of the general assembly, passed at December session 1817; which was referred to the standing committee to be appointed on ways and means.

Mr. Douglas, of Dorchester, from the respective committees appointed on the subjects, reported bills of the following

An act to confirm the name of Lufkin Tall Traverse,

alias Lufkin Tall, of Dorchester county; and

An act to repeal an act, entitled, An act to exempt the servants of overseers of the county roads in Dorchester county from doing duty on said roads, passed December session eighteen hundred and twenty-six, chapter ten.

Which were severally read the first time and ordered to

lie on the table.

On motion by Mr. Steuart of the city of Baltimore, the following order was read and unanimously adopted: Ordered, That the house now adjourn for the purpose of attending the funeral of the late Jonathan Pinkney, at 3 o'clock this evening, as a testimony of respect for the worth and character of the deceased.

The house accordingly adjourned until to-morrow morn-
