4. The number of verdicts rendered for the plaintiff at each term.

5. The number of verdicts rendered for the defendant at each term.

6. The number of cases continued on the trial docket of each term.

7. The number of cases non prossed or dismissed by the plaintiffs at each term on which no jury was sworn.

8. The number of cases abated by the death of the plaintiff at each trial term.

9. The number of cases abated by the death of the defendant at each trial term.

10. The number of judgments confessed at each term.

11. The number of appeal cases decided at each term, shewing the number of reversals and affirmances at each term.

12. And the number of equity cases now open on the dockets of Baltimore county court.

On motion by Mr. Thomas of Frederick, it was Ordered, That the register in chancery, forthwith furnish this house with a statement of the number of cases in the high court of chancery in this state, in which a final decree has not been passed, shewing how many have originated therein, or are on appeal from other tribunals, and what number are from the city of Baltimore, or the several counties of this state respectively, also how long each case has been pending.

On motion by Mr. Ringgold, it was Ordered. That the committee on pecuniary relief be instructed to inquire into the propriety of authorising the levy court of Kent county to levy a sum of money upon said county for the relief of Mary Miller, widow, of said county.

Mr. Semmes presented the petition of John M. Hepburn, of the District of Columbia, administrator de bonis non of John Hepburn, praying that the state will pay over to him a sum of money due to his intestate by William and Robert Mollison, merchants of London, whose property was confiscated by the state.

Ordered, That the said petition, with the accompanying papers and documents, be referred to the standing committee on claims.
