It is with regret we learn that you have rejected the bill, entitled, An act to authorise Henry Miller, of Cecil County, to record a deed. We are well aware that he would have a remedy in the court of chancery, but we are equally aware that it is a very troublesome, and a very expensive proceeding, and in this case it would cost the poor man more than the small property, which is his little all, is worth. We are therefore of opinion, that it would not be a departure from correct legislation, to pass the bill in question, and return it to your house, with a confident hope that you will upon further consideration concur with us.
