

Petitions and memorials, of the following titles, were this day severally presented:

By Mr. Peter, the petition of John Rohr, of Montgomery county, who was a soldier of the revolutionary war, praying for a pension in consideration of his military services.

By Mr. Taney, the petition of Celestine L. T. Wilkinson, widow of the late General James Wilkinson, a native of Calvert county, who was an officer of the revolutionary army, praying that the pension heretofore granted to her late husband, may be restored and continued to her.

Ordered, That the said petitions be severally referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

By Mr. Thomas of St. Mary's, the petition of Ellen Streiby, of the city of Washington, and District of Columbia, praying to be divorced a vinculo matrimonii, from her husband George Streiby.

By Mr. Steuart of Baltimore, the petition of Robert Lawson, of the city of Baltimore, praying to be divorced a mensa et thoro, from his wife Sarah Lawson.

Ordered, That the said petitions be severally referred to the committee on divorces.

Also the petition of the superintendents of the different mechanical branches in the Maryland penitentiary, praying for an increase of their salaries; which was referred to the committee on crimes and punishments.

Also the petition of the lumber dealers of the city of Baltimore, counter to the petition of sundry citizens of the state of New-York, praying that no such alteration in the inspection of lumber, as was prayed for by the lumber merchants of the city of Baltimore at the last session, may be made, and remonstrating against the unfair and unlawful practices of the lumber inspectors of Baltimore, presented by Mr. Thomas of Cecil, on the 16th instant; which was referred to the committee to whom was referred the petition to which this is counter.

And the memorial of sundry citizens of the city of Baltimore, praying for an act to incorporate a society by the name of The Female Penitents' Refuge of Baltimore, and also for pecuniary aid in establishing a house of refuge; which was referred to Messrs. Steuart of Baltimore, M'Mahon and Turner.

By Mr. Thomas of Frederick, the memorial of the citizens of Frederick town, in public meeting assembled, and also the petition of sundry taxable citizens of Frederick city, respectively praying for a law authorising and requiring the corporation of Frederick to levy a tax of three cents in the hundred dollars upon the assessable property of said town, to be applied to the purposes of instruction in the
